Priest, Offering and Worship

Certain parts of the bible are frequently overlooked, especially the Old Testament scripture on sacrificial rituals. We often skipped over them. In our Tuesday Bible study, we are still studying the Exodus. On Mount Sinai, God instructed Moses to lead Israelites in the construction of tabernacle for sanctuary, as well as the items and decoration of the sanctuary. This served as the meeting place between God and man. Moses was also instructed to anoint Aaron and his sons as priests of God. They communicated with God on behalf of the Israelites. There were also detail records on the attire for the high priest and other regular priests that were complex and lengthy. It scares people away after a brief look. However, if we are willing to study them conscientiously and meditate, these ancient scriptures would still have implications on our life.

In Exodus, the priest was a very prestigious position. This was appointed, called, blessed and set apart as holy to God; considered glorious and rewarding, enjoyed the presence of the Holy Spirit. This was also a total offering to God as a living sacrifice. Today, everyone saved by Jesus Christ and become His disciple has the same identity, "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you

out of darkness into his wonderful light." (1 Peter 2:9)

When we study meticulously how a priest should live his life, we shall develop a profound respect. This would make us examine whether our way of life and our deeds measure up to our identity as a priest. Actually, Paul has depicted this in our familiar verses in the book of Romans, "Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will." (Romans 12:1-2)

In today's words, my brothers and sisters, I urge you to seek God's help to put every facets of your daily life: your sleep, meals, academics, job, entertainment and exercise...etc. before God, present it as an offering to Him. Embrace what God has done for you, do your best for Him in return. This is the life of a Christian.

Do not take it easy and lightheartedly get drowned in your world culture. You have to put your focus on God so that this living sacrifice could be integrated into your life and become your second nature. You need to be renewed from inside out. Anytime you learn of what God wants of you, respond promptly. The world culture frequently drags you into her foolish ignorance, and suffocates your spiritual growth. God wants to bring out the best of your life so that you could grow up in a great way. Don't get Him wrong. God does not ask

you to erase all the past from your memory. Instead, God can take all we have now and rearrange in a new order. In His hands, everything can be made anew.

Romans 12:1 used two words: "body", which means "life" and "living sacrifice", which means "offering of life". Paul pointed out that the life of a Christian is a continuous offering of living sacrifice; gave new meaning to both words.

"Life": Sin offering is no longer effective. God demands your whole life. Bulls, lambs and birds are no longer accepted. God wants to receive your life, which encompasses the entire you, feelings, action, thoughts, mind, nervous system, muscles, subconscious, instincts and concepts...etc. You offer your whole life to God.

"Living sacrifice": The blood of a sacrificed animal may leave a lasting impression. However, the slaughtered animal is no longer good for anything other than for food. This is the end of its transient life. On the contrary, we offer a living sacrifice. Our blood stays in the blood vessels and continues to nurture life. As such, a new life gives birth to another life and continues to perpetuate. This kind of whole person offering is pleasing and accepted by God.

Christians offer their life to God everyday as a living sacrifice. This is a "service" and a worshipping lifestyle. Worship and service are integrated parts of our everyday life.

Our usual venue of worship is the temple and altar. Priests will usually take the lead. During worship, we focus on God; engage in an interactive relationship with Him. The worship depicted by Paul refers to the offering of our whole self, is a living sacrifice.

The basic difficulty here is that we limit our worship within the confines of temple and the activities inside, including sermon, prayers, announcement, hymns and the Lord's supper...etc. However, God wants us to expand our worship into our home, our work, our neighborhood and our entertainment. Worship is a lifestyle, through which, we present ourselves as living sacrifice to God.

We have different skills, different strengths and different feelings. God assembles us into one body so that we can share our lives. Nobody can live a full life all by himself. Selective collaboration and sharing only with certain people of our choice will not glorify God. Everyone is the creation of God, made to be a member of this body. We exist as a family, a unified body, not an individual. God regards this family His residence, where He is worshipped.

Life is filled with uneven distribution of wealth. The act of worship also involves responding to other people's financial needs. This is fundamentally conflicting with our human nature. We all considered our estate as what we worked hard for. It is our accomplishment, the fruit of our success. In response to the needs of others or the church, a little step-up offering should suffice. However, worship demands more than this. For the glory of God, the financial offering has to be

complete, meaning that we must generously take care of the needs of others without constraints. We should be aware that our income and capability to earn are the gifts from God. Complete offering should be our obligation.

The other aspect of worship is presenting our heart, our thoughts and mind, including evil intentions, sins hidden deep in our hearts, such as hostility, wicked intentions and slander against people who offended us. We refuse to wish them well, but demand vengeance. Worship is to turn such bitterness and vengeful heart around. Replace cursing with blessing, vengeance with pardon and conflicts with peace.

Worship is not a religious show for our entertainment at leisure. It demands our participation, submission to the correction by God.

Worship is presenting our entire self as offering to God, to be used by Him. We are either rectified by God or corrupted by the world. Either we conform to the pattern of this world or be transformed by renewing of our mind.

God uses worship to transform and renew our life!
